ECO-TIPS

To Care for God's Creation

Toxics: Many cleaning products contain chemicals that are bad for your health and the environment, and have not been adequately tested for their harmful effects. Clean safely by making your own green cleaners. Follow this simple recipe for an all-purpose cleaner:

- 4 cups warm water
- 2 Tablespoons of vinegar or lemon juice
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 2 Tablespoons of natural liquid soap (such as Dr. Bronnor's orange scented)
- 10 drops of essential oil (Lavender, Pine or Tea Tree)—optional, but helps

disinfect and adds a good smell

Mix water, vinegar and baking soda first, then add the soap and essential oil.

• *Toxics:* Pesticides are designed to be harmful, and have been linked to many severe illnesses in both humans and wildlife (Beyond Pesticides). Children are especially susceptible to these chemicals since they are frequently touching surfaces, and they breathe more air per pound of body weight than

adults. Search for the least toxic methods for controlling pests in your home: http://www.beyondpesticides.org/alternatives/factshe ets/index.htm

- Food: Worldwide meat production releases more greenhouse gas emissions than the entire transportation sector combined (Source: UN Environment Programme). Start small by eliminating meat one day per week, or challenge yourself by taking a week-long vegetarian pledge. See www.meatlessmonday.org or www.vegetariantimes.com for good recipes and more information.
- *Food:* A typical carrot travels 1,838 miles to reach your dinner table (Sustainable Table). Support your farmers close to home and reduce your carbon footprint by visiting farmers' markets or participating in Community Supported Agriculture: www.localharvest.org
- *Food:* Nearly 70% of commercial fishing grounds are depleted or recovering from overfishing (Source: UN Food and Agriculture Organization). Before ordering seafood, reach for your Seafood Watch pocket guide:

www.seafoodwatch.org which will give you the 'red' light or 'green' when deciding what to choose.

• *Food:* As much as forty percent of the energy used in the food system goes towards the production of chemical fertilizers and pesticides (Sustainable Table). Can't afford to eat everything organically? Some fruits and vegetables are sprayed with more pesticides than others, and cannot be cleaned of pesticide residues as easily—start small by choosing organic for these 'Dirty Dozen' fruits and vegetables that fit this category: peach, apple, bell pepper, celery, nectarine, strawberries, cherries, kale, lettuce, grapes (imported), carrot, and pears. http://www.foodnews.org/

Even for someone like me who genuinely enjoys a good snowfall and the rhythm of the seasons, winter can still take some getting used to. Winter is characterized by shorter days, by cold temperatures, and precipitation that literally sticks around. You may enjoy all of this. If, however, you are one of those longing for sunny days and warm breezes, or are pining for home, which is especially distant at this time, then perhaps the winter season is an apt metaphor for Psalm 42.

Here the Psalmist is "pouring out the soul," or as the Hebrew can translate "soul,": pouring out one's emotions, breath, life. Literally, the Psalmist has been "poured out," marking it with tears which have served as "food day and night." The soul is "downcast" and "disquieted" or "disturbed." "Why have you [God] forgotten me?" the Psalmist queries.

You know this. In some deep way, you know this wintry mix of cold and darkness in your own life, and your own "pouring out of the soul." You are spent, empty, tired. You feel isolated, disconnected. All around you, your "enemies" jeer—people who feel threatened by you or who have yet to welcome you; there are the failures at your feet, the disastrous program, the loss of income, unmet expectations, the work that overwhelms and the injustices that anger; critical funds have been pulled, relationships have broken, faith falters, the kingdom of God seems, not at hand, but certainly far off.

A choice soon approaches, like the moistened air just before a snowfall. You know you cannot live on this way. You make a choice to believe--if only out of a desperate need and not some noble ability on your part. You choose to believe that God, the One whose very presence connects all living things, the One who has called you, sustains you just as all creation is sustained, *this* One, is good. You realize that as cliché as it can sound, or as poster-perfect but intellectually unsatisfying it can be, believing that God is good is like gathering around a warm fire on a long, winter's night.

There, even in the darkness, God is present, at work. "Deep calls to deep." Beneath the frozen ground, there is life anew, blossoming and approaching. There, in the darkness, you will receive your strength. And from there, you will offer your life's song to others. Amen."

Eco-Tips To Care for God's Creation

- *Transportation:* 10 seconds of idling uses more fuel than turning the engine on and off (NJDEP). Turn your engine off when you are sitting for more than 10 seconds, especially near children and in urban areas where pollution levels are already high.
- *Transportation:* The U.S. is responsible for 45% of the world's total global warming pollution from vehicles (Environmental Defense). Purchasing a fuelefficient car is one of the most effective environmental choices you can make. When it comes time to purchase a vehicle, aim for one that is rated at 36 miles per gallon or higher: http://www.fueleconomy.gov/
- *Transportation:* \$6,251: Amount the average two-worker household saves annually by taking public transportation instead of driving a car (Source: Environmental Defense). Have you checked out the mass transit routes near your home, and do you use mass transit as often as possible? Where mass transit is infeasible try other sustainable methods of transportation: walking, riding a bike or carpooling.





VISIONS April 2011

s I type this letter for the newsletter I am on my way back on New Jersey on the Amtrak train from a few days of continuing education time in our nation's capital of Washington D.C. I was there for an annual conference that happens every year called Ecumenical Advocacy Days. You can check out their website for more information (www.advocacydays.org). The last time I went to this conference was in 2007, and it is always a rich experience. This time I went in a new capacity, as one of the people involved in the mission work of the PC(USA) in Colombia, and host to our two Colombian



Pastors who are visiting with us. Together we shared the leadership of a panel on the effects of war in Colombia on women and children, and we spent two full days lobbying our Congress (including some of our NJ reps) on US legislation as it pertains to Colombia. I found myself many times over the weekend moved to tears as I listened to my Colombian sisters speak with great courage about the ministry they do in place of such deep violence, fear, and war. I remember my first trip to Colombia twelve years ago, meeting the church there for the first time—and it still is a wonder to me today I get to help facilitate the work of some of the mission of our larger church in Colombia, and that I get to be a part of such holy conversations like the ones we had in DC this weekend every once in a while.

You might be asking yourself, why would a Presbyterian, a Christian, spend time doing things like talking to Congress? For me, it is because one of the central ways I follow Jesus is to make sure that the world we live in is more just and equitable for all of God's people. As a person of privilege, I have an opportunity to speak up, and for me, that feels like my duty as a person who loves Jesus and wants to see his vision of justice for people to be recognized. It's not something I do all of the time, but occasionally, when the opportunity presents itself. We should all find ways that make sense in our lives to speak up, and to be a voice for those who cannot speak for themselves—I do believe it is what Jesus would have us do!

For me, the conference time, while busy, was also a time of relaxation and spiritual renewal. I got to see old friends, some of them from my time in Seminary and other places around the church. Hanging out with friends is good for the soul—and so many of my friends are dispersed around the country (and I even saw one who was here visiting from Bolivia!). I got to some great workshops about ways to bring back advocacy around local issues of hunger and community development that directly impact the things we are wanting to accomplish here in mission at WAPC—and I was inspired again about my ongoing role as a pastor. Having



REV. ADELAIDA JIMÉNEZ CORTES is an ordained minister and member of Council in the Iglesia Presbiteriana de Colombia (Presbyterian Church of Colombia. She works as Pastor to three Presbyterian congregations in Barranquilla as well as the Chaplain to the Colegio Americano (American School). Displaced by violence in Colombia, her family recently lived in the United States for nearly three years; working with congregations and organizations to promote understanding about the situation in Colombia, while also working on a Masters in Theological Studies at McCormick Seminary in Chicago. Today Adelaida is working with the Reformed University (in Barranquilla) as Director of the Theology Program. She coordinates the group of investigations (REMEFES—Recuperation of the Historical Memory with Faith and Hope). This investigation is recovering the collective memories of displaced persons in Colombia, especially those of women and children. Adeladia is married to the Rev. Milton Mejía. Together they have two children, Iván and Andrés.

REV. GLORIA ULLOA is an ordained minister in the Iglesia Presbiteriana de Colombia. She has extensive experience in religious education, pastoral and public administration, women's rights, conflict resolution, and community organization. She holds a Bachelors of Theology degree from the Biblical Seminary of Medellin, Colombia, is licensed in elementary education, and holds the Diplomate in Pedagogical Strategies from the University of the North in Barranquilla, Colombia. Most recently, Gloria has served as the Executive Secretary of the Presibteria de la Costa (Colombia, and as Director of Secondary Education at the Colegio Americano in Barranquilla, Colombia. She is currently the Chaplain at the Colegio. She has significant cross-cultural experience, in 2003-2004 she served as an International Peacemaker for the Presbyterian Church (USA) and has been honored in Colombia not just for her work in the church, but by governmental officials for her ongoing dedication to women's rights.

<u>'In Christ we are not alone'</u> MISSION PARTNERS, WORKERS IN JAPAN FEEL SUPPORTED BY PRAYERS

General Assembly Mission Council by <u>Judson Taylor</u>, Communications Associate World Mission

In the aftermath of the Japanese earthquake and tsunami catastrophe on March 11, the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.)'s global partners and mission co-workers have been buoyed by the transformative power and solidarity of prayer.

The Presbyterian World Mission ministry area has been in contact with several of its partner organizations and churches and with all of its mission workers in Japan since the devastating earthquake and tsunami on March

Messages from PC(USA) mission partners and institutionshave expressed thanks and provided information about specific situations and responses. "[Your] encouragement makes us realize in Christ we are not alone," wrote the Korean Christian Church in Japan Many tell about churches and members suffering from the disaster, refugees living in shelters, and the shortage of food, relief supplies, and fuel. But they are organizing to assess the needs and help get aid to those in the greatest need. A spokesman for the Reformed Church of Japan wrote: "We would like to be effective witnesses to the Lord in the midst of devastation."

The United Church of Christ (Kyodan), the church the PC(USA) works most closely with, reported a number of members missing and at least one confirmed death. A staff member of a nursery school related to Iwaki Church died on the day of the earthquake while communicating with the children's parents. Some of the churches have hosted refugees. The chapel of Shinsei Kamaishi Church in the coastal fishing city of Kamaishi was reportedly filled with mud and oil. Built in 2000, it was known as a pioneer "eco-church," with a solar-power system and transparent glass roof.

Rev. Isamu Koshiishi, moderator of the National Christian Council in Japan (NCCJ), is thankful for the prayers of so many in the United States. He says the NCCJ's assessing the damages and recovery will take some time, but "we have been encouraged and strengthened by the many messages of support from our Christian brothers and sisters all over the world. Our immediate request is for you to continue to keep us in your prayers as we are coordinating a network of local support for those most severely affected. At this time of our great need, we want you to know how grateful we are for your expressions of support and solidarity."

"We are touched by your prayers," wrote an officer of the Kyodan. Yodogawa Christian Hospital in Osaka, one of the institutions with which the PC(USA) has had a strong relationship, wrote: "Thank you so very much for your prayers. Our hospital patients and staff and their families are all safe, but our hearts ache as the earthquake disasters are spreading in other parts of Japan. We are praying for God's protection and comfort over those people in the earthquake-affected areas."

Eco-Tips To Care for God's Creation

- Waste Reduction: Recycling one aluminum can saves enough energy to run a TV for 3 hours. Save energy and resources by recycling your glass, aluminum, plastic and paper. Check your city's recycling guide to find out what materials are recyclable in your area.
- Waste Reduction: Individual households receive thousands of pieces of junk mail each year, most of which is printed on virgin paper and is not recycled. Reduce your junk mail by 90% in one easy step: http://mailstopper.tonic.com/. For a small fee, Mail Stopper will remove you from junk mailing lists and plant 5 trees.
- *Water:* Only 1% of the water on Earth is drinkable, with more and more water sources drying up each day (UN Environment Programme). Reduce your water usage and your water bill immediately by installing a low-flow showerhead and aerators on all water faucets. Look for devices that are EPA Water Sense labeled:

http://www.epa.gov/WaterSense/

• Water: Fill a plastic water bottle ½ of the way full with oil—this is how much oil is required to make the typical bottle of water. The numbers are staggering—adding up the plastic used, the energy required to collect and clean the water, and the fuel it takes to ship the bottles to stores, equates to millions of barrels of oil each year (Sierra Club). Kick the bottled water habit by installing a water filter on your faucet and purchasing a reusable water bottle. Aim for a water bottle that does not leach chemicals, by looking for 'BPA Free' labels, or by choosing stainless steel.




VISIONS June 2011

Dear WAPC Members and Friends,

We are writing to let you know about some important and exciting developments in the administration of the After School Program. We invite you to read this letter and the information attached to it carefully.

As you know, for many years the program that our church has hosted has been provided as an outreach to the North Plainfield community by the Watchung Avenue Presbyterian Church. The program first began with a small group of volunteer leaders, and has grown over the years into the program that it is today. However, the program has struggled over the last few years as the economy has taken its toll on our families and program. Costs have been increasing—utilities, gas, insurance, salaries, and State fees. Yet, despite a nominal tuition increase over the last year, we have not been able to keep up with costs. We strongly feel that the families who we serve cannot bear additional fee increases. The program has been operating at a near break-even, some months at a deficit, for the last two years. While it has been a long-term commitment of the Watchung Avenue Presbyterian Church to house such a program, the congregation has also struggled deeply with its finances over the last five years due to the downturn in the economy and is also operating at a significant deficit. All of these factors together are making it difficult for the congregation to sustain long-term funding assistance to the After School Program. We have been carefully evaluating these difficulties we face over this year and attempting to discern which path to take: continue our program as it is with ever-increasing deficits and looming costs or to make the painful decision to end the program. Neither was a good decision, and so we have struggled throughout the year to discern which path would be the most faithful one to go down.

Thankfully, a third way has come to us, one which we are very excited about, and that will allow our core principals of the After School Program to stay in place:

- That safe, quality, and affordable After School care is available to the children of North Plainfield
- That our congregation remains a place of welcome and support for such a program
- That a program exists in North Plainfield that provides financial support and assistance to families who need it so that their children have all services needed available to them
- That an After School Program include academic assistance to students, recreation, nutrition, and character development

Beginning in the Fall of 2011, the Plainfield Area YMCA will be taking over the administration of the After School Program at the Watchung Avenue Presbyterian Church. The Plainfield Y operates After School Programs in the Plainfield/North Plainfield area, but does not have a location in North Plainfield. We will become an extension site for the YMCA and they will become responsible for the administration of the program which will include all of the features we already have in place: transportation, staff, and programming. As we have entered into conversation this year with the Plainfield Y we have discovered that their day-to-day programming is nearly identical to the one we have here at Watchung Avenue Presbyterian Church and that their fee structure is comparable to the one we currently have, actually \$20 less a month. More services will be available to the children we serve, including weekly swim lessons, additional recreational activities, a new computer lab at the church for the 2011-2012 academic year, and year-round usage of the YMCA in Plainfield and its facilities.

The Session of the Watchung Avenue Presbyterian Church voted at their May 9, 2011 meeting to implement this change for the After School Program and to enter into a contractual relationship with the Plainfield YMCA. The After School Program staff and parents were notified the same week and our staff will be able to apply for employment with the Plainfield YMCA for the 2011-2012 year.

We are so excited about this new development in the life of the After School Program and that it will be able to continue and serve the children and youth of North Plainfield. We see this as a win-win for everyone, especially for you and your children!

We will be celebrating the ministry of our After School Program in worship on Sunday June 12th and we invite the entire congregation to join us at that special worship service and reception. Please join us in prayer for the After School Program during its next exciting chapter of service to the children of our community!

Hello dear friends and family, today marks one month since I left the United States for my three week sojourn/class to southern India, and one week since I landed here in South Africa on my 26th birthday. The past month has been a whirlwind of amazing experiences.

In India, I and about thirty other Princeton Theological Seminary students had the privilege to study at the feet of a trio of remarkable professors for a course entitled "Preaching in a Global Context" that took place at the India Sunday School Union located at Coornoor, India, high up in the Nilgiris mountain range in the Indian state of Tamil Nadu. Professor of Preaching at Princeton, Cleo LaRue nominally led the course, and while he lectured a handful of times, the main focus was for us to study under two Indian professors, one Ajit Prasadam, PHD in practical theology and the moderator of the Indian Sunday School Union, and Dyanchad Carr, an Indian theologian of some repute who specializes in Dalit theology, theology directed towards and emerging from the context of the out-castes of Indian society, the Untouchables as they are known in English. While perhaps I do not not agree theologically with everything Dr. Carr taught, through his powerfully passionate lectures he forced me to open my eyes to engage with those who exist on the margins of Christian scripture and our globalized world society, and see how Christ empowers, speaks, and works through them. I think I will be reflecting on my Indian experiences for a long time to come, but to be honest, I really did not have much time to do any serious reflection at all while in India. I was constantly on the move, from one place to another. sleeping either on short plane rides, long train rides, or even longer bus rides as I traveled across the subcontinent. Over the summer, I'll be sure to share more of my time in India with you all, but right now, I'm trying to recover from it all.

Getting to South Africa from Capetown was a bit of an adventure, a total of about thirty hours of travel, and a stop in Abu Dhabi on the way, where I swam in the Persian Gulf, earned me a mean sun-burn, and saw the movie Thor with four Bedouin men in full regalia. I arrived to Cape Town on the 18th, election day, and the city swirled with democratic (if you can call it that) passions. I have since begun to try and settle a bit, battling jetlag all the way but throwing myself head first into the activities and ministries of the Church I am serving at. I have to make the best of the time I have here, and to do so it doesn't really give me much breathing room. I'm

not complaining. I enjoy the church, Mowbray Presbyterian. It had about 175 in attendence last sunday, and it seems to be one of those rare churches in South Africa that is multi-racial, to the extent that it has a sunstantial white, black, and "coloured" population (coloured being a term that has hung-over from the bad old times of Apartheid, that refers to mixed race or folks of Indian backgrounds). The services are in English, but the singing is in many different languages. I think I am going to grow to love this church, but right now I do miss the congregation I served over the course of middle year at PTS, Watchung Avenue Presbyterian Church. Watchung helped me discover the gifts for pastoral ministry that are now being put to the test in South Africa, and for that, I'm grateful.

The contrast between southern India and Capetown is remarkable. India, when glanced at with western eyes, is absolutely insane. The hustle and bustle of society there truly is an impressive thing, and in all my life I've never really encountered anything you like it. Wherever you are, there a mass of people, heading to and fro on their business, zipping around on fast motorbikes (the preferred way of traveling I gathered, and by far the most fun. I had a blast being ferried around on the back of a bike through the mountains) or driving in cars and trucks in what I perceived to be a reckless manner (even more reckless than Kenya), drivers having full and detailed conversations with those that pass through their car horns. I swear, I have never heard more tricked out car horns in my life. There was no such thing as an ordinary beep--think clown horns, but syncopate the beats and make them ten times louder. Capetown, in contrast, is on the surface orderly, with smooth roads and very little horn beeping. I rarely see people on the side of the roads like I saw in India and Kenya, but I know they must be there somewhere, in some part of the city I haven't seen yet. The economic disparity is profound, and the difference between middle class white and black existence in the city and poor black experience in the Townships, is hard to describe. Maybe in time I'll find the words.

A highlight from India: when cars went in reverse, they would play a song. I heard all sorts of catchy back up tunes, hymns, bollywood anthems, muslim calls to prayer. I hope this catches on in the States.

I've only been in South Africa for a week, and I really can't report back much. That will change.

Your thoughts and prayers are readily appreciated, and any notes you would like to send my way via email or post. I am not without work here to keep me busy--I'll be preaching about five or times over the course of the two and a half months I am here, leading Bible studies and workshops, and doing all manner of things that my supervisors here in Mowbray ask me to do. But notes from all of you back at home will do my soul some good.



Excerpted from the book...."When we start with the wrong question, no matter how good an answer we get, it won't give us the results we want. Rather than joining the throngs who are asking, When will this economic crisis be over? Jim Wallis says the right question to ask is How will this crisis change us?

The worst thing we can do now, Wallis tells us, is to go back to normal. Normal is what got us into this situation. We need a new normal, and this economic crisis is an invitation to discover what that means. Some of the principles Wallis unpacks for our new normal are . . .

- Spending money we don't have for things we don't need is a bad foundation for an economy or a family.
- It's time to stop keeping up with the Joneses and start making sure the Joneses are okay.
- The values of commercials and billboards are not the things we want to teach our children.
- Care for the poor is not just a moral duty but is critical for the common good.
- A healthy society is a balanced society in which markets, the government, and our communities all play a role.
- The operating principle of God's economy says that there is enough if we share it.
- And much, much more . . .

In the pages of this book, Wallis provides us with a moral compass for this new economy—one that will guide us on Wall Street, Main Street, and Your Street."

We will use the study guide from Sojourners and also look at the Accra Confession from the World Alliance of Reformed Churches (of which we are a part) as we talk about God, the Bible, and the economic times we are in.

Meets ½ hour after worship every Sunday in June and July in the downstairs lounge. Class will go for one hour each week and participants will read one chapter in the book weekly.



VISIONS September 2011

After the last two weeks we've had here in New Jersey it seems only appropriate to write about the world around us. A rare earthquake just outside of Washington D.C. that shook us up this far north. Cracks in the Washington Monmument, spires falling off the National Cathedral. And then of course, the much bigger event of Hurricane Irene. Luckily, some of the steam ran out before she got to us, but the affects of this huge and monster storm have been devastating for many and the responsibility now falls to those of us who were spared the worst to help out our neighbors as we can. We seem to be at the mercy of the whims of nature these days.

I will admit to being very shaken up by Hurricane Irene. Our town had a mandatory evacuation, and we were told to expect the bay to inundate the town (and our home is only a block off the bay!). Juan and I packed up our most valued possessions, Sofia packed up her pet rabbit, and we headed away from our home. I spent most of the night of the Hurricane tossing and turning in my sleep, worrying about our home and neighborhood. I am sure I wasn't alone—and that countless other people had very sleepless nights too! We were very lucky to have been spared the worst (only water in the basement), but many around us, even those in our own congregation, have much more signifigant problems in their homes. Like everyone else, I do not enjoy those feelings of being out of control, and not able to protect my own home.

Even though I love all of it, the truth is, my home is just full of stuff. The most important things we were able to get out—Juan, Sofia, her rabbit, Juan's paintings, and our photos. Most of what we "own" in this life, at the end of the day, isn't terribly valuable. The real "things of value" if you get down to it, are really a small percentage of what makes up our accumulated life. There is that verse in the Matthew's gospel: "Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust consume and where thieves break in and steal; but store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust consumes and where thieves do not break in and steal. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also." Perhaps one of the benefits of the last few weeks is that we are reminded to think more clearly about what our

true possessions of value are—and where our true treasures in this life and the next life.

As you all know, I am an avid gardener, and love growing all sorts of flowers and plants in the summer. One of the things that upset me the most when we were leaving our house was the prospect that the brackish bay water going to inundate neighborhood and kill my plants. That is one "possession" I'm very tied to! Mieke Vandersall, who many of you have met, was visiting us last weekend when we

had to pack up the house. Mieke and Sofia set out to cut all of the flowers and arrange them in vases while Juan and I packed up the house. At least we could enjoy them cut! One of the things we couldn't cut were our rose bushes. They were full of buds but not yet blooms. When we returned home late the next day, grateful our part of town did not flood, our rose bush was in bloom. A reminder that I need to trust a bit more, and that even when things look stormy and gloomy—beautiful new things can emerge. My roses bloomed in the middle of the hurricane!

The other thing that is very much on my mind these days is the 10th anniversary of September 11th. It is a day that is seared into my memory, as I know it is for each of us. We live just outside of New York City, and all of our communities were so deeply affected. Many of us remember friends, neighbors, family who were lost on that day. Others of us mourn the violence of that day and the violence that it has spawned. It changed us. I find myself in a very reflective mood as the anniversary approaches.

When I served the Rumson Church we participated in quite a few funerals post-9/11. One of those was for a man who left behind his wife (a member of the Session) and his two children, one in high school, the other in college. The experience of that funeral, walking the journey of grief with that family made an impression on me that will last forever.

About a year before I left Rumson, the widow of the man who died in the Towers called me. She had begun rebuilding her life and was dating someone. They wanted to get married, would I marry them? Her children and his were in attendance at the wedding, along with her former husband's supportive parents—celebrating her new chapter in life, and also honoring what had been in the past. New life, new beginnings rose out of the ashes and the rubble of life.

A good friend of mine in ministry in this Presbytery wrote a few days ago that the Hurricane is a "reminder that the universe doesn't center around us." As Juan likes to remind me more often than I like to hear it, "we are not in control." But there are enough reminders around us to see that even in the midst of destruction, sadness, anniversaries, and all those things out there in the world that terrify us—that God is in control, making a way, and always in the business of Resurrection, New Life, and Beauty....



At times our leap of faith jumps a bit too far, but our last shipment on May 7 broke the record as we had to fill each room with materials that did not get aboard for the container.

So now we need to assess just what we have in those rooms in order to determine how hard we have to press to gather enough materials to fill our October 15 cargo container.



Latin American Protestant leaders criticize U.S. budget decisions

LOUISVILLE — More than 100 Protestant leaders from 12 countries in Latin America, representing diverse denominations and ministries, have written an open letter expressing their concern over the economic crisis in the United States and the decisions being made by the U.S. Congress to address it.

In their letter addressed to Christians in the United States, the Latin American leaders urge them to "lift up the voice of the millions of people who do not have a part in the major economic decisions being made in Washington, D.C."

They call upon U.S. government officials to recognize that the actions they take have consequences not only in the U.S. but also on the economies of other nations, and therefore in both the short and long terms, they will be affect millions of people in the countries of the global south.

Congress recently raised the debt limit of the U.S. by \$2 billion in exchange for budget cuts that will affect social programs that benefit the poor, not only in the U.S., but also in other countries, the letter states.

Expressing solidarity with the poor in the U.S., the Latin American leaders express their surprise and indignation at how the economic crisis has been addressed, and criticize politicians who "only embrace the interests of the rich, while preferring cuts to social programs that serve those in greatest need."

"Paying more taxes will not bankrupt the rich. Cutting social benefits for retired people, the sick, and others puts the lives of such persons at risk. Is this not brutally unjust?," they exclaim.

The Latin American evangelical leaders encourage U.S. Christians to join the efforts already undertaken by various churches and Christian organizations, such as those leading the "Circle of Protection" movement, among others.

"Do not falter in your efforts, even though these may be lonely times for those whose prophetic voice does not appear to be heard by the politicians," the letter concludes.

The letter is signed by a broad array of Latin American Protestant leaders: the presidents of the Protestant Councils and Alliances in countries such as Peru, Ecuador, Honduras, Argentina, Brasil and Uruguay, as well as directors of humanitarian aid and social action organizations.

It is also signed by such international bodies as the Latin American Council of Churches (CLAI), Fellowship of Evangelical Churches (CONELA), the Association of Reformed and Presbyterian Churches of Latin America (AIPRAL), the Micah Network, Red del Camino (the Network of the Way), the Movement Together for Children and others.

Denominational leaders who are signers include the Assembly of God, Baptists, Church of God, Free Brothers, Pentecostals, Presbyterians, Methodists, Lutherans, Reformed, Episcopalians. Other signers include seminary rectors and presidents, directors of national Bible societies, professors of theology, and leaders of other professional Christian networks.

The full text of the letter, dated Aug. 18:

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

We are fellow believers with you in the God who has never ceased reaching out to defend the poor and the excluded. We view with deep concern recent decisions in the United States that will add to the suffering of the most vulnerable members of U.S. society.

As people of faith who have ourselves lived through economic and political turbulence in recent decades, we join with U.S. religious leaders from all Christian faith traditions who are fulfilling their prophetic role by standing in solidarity with the poor. In such times, faith leaders must be true to their vocation and amplify the voices of the vulnerable millions that have been excluded from the heated political debates that have raged in Washington.

Those who govern should know that the decisions made in your country have consequences for the economies of other nations around the world. In the medium and long term, they will affect the lives of millions of people in the countries of the Global South. It seems to us immoral that politicians, with some exceptions, embrace only the interests of the wealthy, preferring to cut social assistance to those in greatest need.

We know the generosity and solidarity of the American people and the assistance programs to the poor that operate through churches and civil society organizations in Latin America.

It is therefore inconceivable to us that the wealthy make no effort to take responsibility for the debt generated by the country as a whole. Paying more taxes will not bankrupt them. Cutting social benefits jeopardizes the lives of the retired, the sick and others who are in need. Is this not brutally unjust?

Therefore we, the undersigned Christian leaders of Latin America, write to express our solidarity with the people of the United States, especially those who embrace Christianity, who call for a true and just resolution to this crisis — a crisis that is not only economic, but also, and above all, moral.

We encourage you to join the efforts of various churches, including those called "Circle of Protection." Our prayers are with you, dear brothers and sisters in the faith. Do not falter in your efforts, although these may be lonely times for people whose prophetic voice the politicians seem not to want to hear.

God is watching the politicians and will not stop telling them: "Give justice to the poor!" (Psalm 82:3)

VISIONS October 2011

Most of the people I know will not join organizations. The concept of "membership" is a foreign one to most people today. I know many of us value and prize membership. We join, our names are on the rolls of members, we pay our dues, and we participate in activities.

But that's not where many people are anymore in how they relate to organizations and membership. One of the reasons so many people I know my generation won't join as "members" is because the idea has become empty to them. They have experienced organizations where they have been treated as just a name on a list, a number, and worst of all: someone to solicit for money without any tangible benefit.

People want to **be** more than that, and they want to **do** more than that. They want to be a part of groups and movements that invite them into leadership, encourage them to share their gifts, and help them grow and develop. I believe that people are looking for new ways of forming community.

Unfortunately, this "anti-membership-organization attitude" affects long-term congregations like ours that are membership-based. People who do not know anything about congregations, who have not had the joy of participating in them, can assume that we are like other groups out there that they have had bad relationships with. And as you and I also know, many people have had or heard about very painful experiences others have had with religious groups. These things stack up against us and we have little control over them. Until people experience who we are and what we are like, it's hard for them to come in the doors and give us a try. It's a real challenge for congregations today, because there are no easy answers on how to encourage people to give us that first try, and then to engage them in ways that allow them to use their gifts in ways that make sense to them, not to us.

Bob Goellner, Jeanne Fedoryk, and I are tasked with the jobs of long-range planning and church growth for the Session. We've been working on a variety of things, but we want to begin this fall with having regularly-scheduled Sundays where every single member of WAPC (no matter your age) to invite a friend to come and worship with us. We want you to reach out and invite someone who is not part of a church, who maybe doesn't even know what "church" is, or who you think is looking for something more in their lives. **Invite** them to join you on a Sunday at WAPC. You are our best advertisers and evangelists about WAPC because you love the church, you are here week in and week out, and you know the joys of being a part of this community.

We are not asking anyone to join the church. We do not want to push membership on people, that's not the point and we know that pushing membership will turn many people off and be counterproductive. Just an open invitation, no pressure, no strings attached. I believe if we live into an attitude like this we can grow our congregation and create an atmosphere of welcome for all people.

Just this past Tuesday night Doug Boylen, Bob Goellner, Mary Anne Ronk, and I went to a presentation of the Presbytery on our new Form of Government in the Presbyterian Church. A lot of it is technical, and can be a bit boring, but there is also some beautiful new language in the Church about who we are and what we do. Some of the best language in it

is about membership. I encourage you to read it and contemplate its meaning in your life. Just because we are members, part of the church, does not mean we stay in one play emotionally or spiritually! *God does not call us to be stuck in our ways—but to be about personal and community transformation every single day of our lives!*

Membership in the Church of Jesus Christ is a joy and a privilege. It is also a commitment to participate in Christ's mission. A faithful member bears witness to God's love and grace and promises to be involved responsibly in the ministry of Christ's Church. Such involvement includes:

- proclaiming the Good News in word and deed,
- taking part in the common life and worship of a congregation,
- lifting one another up in prayer, mutual concern, and active support,
- studying Scripture and the issues of Christian faith and life,
- supporting the ministry of the church through the giving of money, time, and talents,
- demonstrating a new quality of life within and through the church,
- responding to God's activity in the world through service to others,
- living responsibly in the personal, family, vocational, political, cultural, and social relationships of life,
- working in the world for peace, justice, freedom, and human fulfillment,
- participating in the governing responsibilities of the church, and
- reviewing and evaluating regularly the integrity of one's membership, and considering ways in which one's participation in the worship and service of the church may be increased and made more meaningful.

"Membership" in the church isn't about our name on a roster or the rolls. It's not about numbers. It's about the character and the quality of our witness as people who follow Jesus Christ. It's about transformed lives and transformed communities. It's about a radical choice to follow and lead. I am always much more excited about these things than counting heads, and filling out membership demographic forms.

Jesus was into a Way of Life—not numbers, and not statistics. Jesus was about transformation and about actively engaging the world. We have really, really Good News to tell our friends, family members, neighbors, and co-workers. We have something substantial and engaging to invite them into.

So mark Sunday October 23, 2011 on your calendar. Make the commitment whether you are an adult, a child, working, retired—no matter who you are to invite someone to our church on that day.

The responsibility is for every single one of us. We want everyone to participate and to extend the hand of welcome and invitation in the name of Christ to someone you know.

And we'll let the Spirit do the rest.





A CALL TO GARDEN

N. Plainfield congregations grow fresh food for the needy

NORTH PLAINFIELD — The Rev. Shannan Vance-Ocampo couldn't help but notice a unifying theme at just about every food pantry she ever visited.

"Usually," the pastor of Watchung Avenue Presbyterian Church remarked, "everything is canned."

Not around here, though — not anymore. The borough church has teamed up with the nearby Catholic Community of Saint Joseph to launch a community garden to feed the hungry, having grown more than 1,000 fresh vegetables since the start of the summer.

"People have really loved having fresh stuff," Vance-Ocampo said. "I think it's been a great project."

The bounty has included cucumbers, tomatoes, squash, broccoli, cabbage, eggplants, green bell peppers and even jalapenos. The idea for the garden was sparked when the owner of a local restaurant, Organigaya Cafe, held an organic plant sale this spring but found himself with a surplus when sales didn't go quite as well as expected, Vance-Ocampo explained.

"He had a lot that didn't get sold, so he just donated them to us," she said.

The garden quickly started drawing attention from both congregations, with about 20 people regularly chipping in by planting, tending to and harvesting crops. Members of Watchung Avenue Presbyterian Church's youth group even got in on the act, using techniques they learned on a summer trip to a farm in upstate New York.

Many of the first season's vegetables have been harvested and prepared for donation alongside recipe suggestions, Vance-Ocampo said — noting that her congregation has taken the lead on managing the garden, while Saint Joseph handles the distribution end of things.

"They're across the street from us, so I think it makes it easier," she said.

The concept even has drawn the attention of other local religious leaders, some of whom called it a good example of a low-cost, high-reward, hands-on method of reaching out to the less fortunate.

"Watchung Avenue Presbyterian Church's and St. Joseph's Church's efforts connect the dots between the health of the earth and the health of the community," said the Rev. Fletcher Harper, executive director of GreenFaith, a Highland Park—based interfaith coalition supporting environmental conscientiousness.

"It's been exciting to watch the growth of this ecumenical effort, and it is a real model for others around the country," he said.

And with the project's first year winding down, leaders already are starting to think about how to grow even more in the future.

"As a leader of a congregation, I know that the call of God is to feed those who are hungry, care for creation and build up the community. This garden gave our two congregations the opportunity to do all three, while also having a really great time," Vance-Ocampo said. "We look forward to continuing and expanding this mission and ecumenical partnership in the years to come."



The Rev. Brooks Smith, Jack Dellipaoli of the Basking Ridge Presbyterian Church and Skip Winter of the First Presbyterian Church of Cranford will be reporting on their recent mission trip to Haiti (October 24 to October 31). Through pictures and discussion, attendees will be able to hear first hand accounts about the current economic and social situation in Haiti and what is being done not only by PCUSA mission co-workers and Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) Aid, but also by many international relief groups that are working to improve the quality of life for the Haitian people.

The Haiti mission team will be visiting three locations during their visit. The Montesorri Teacher Training School in Liancourt was heavily damaged during the earthquake. We will observe the marvelous strides that have been accomplished in rebuilding this important center of teacher training. Our second stop will be in Leogane, the site of the St. Croix Hospital. The hospital was also badly damaged during the earthquake. Thanks to funds donated by Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA), families are once able to make use of the facilities. Our third stop will be in the town of Jeremie, where a health clinic is run by friends of health in Haiti and led by Dr. Katie Wolff, a Presbyterian elder from Kingston, NJ.

VISIONS December 2011

SOME IMPORTANT INFORMATION ABOUT WORSHIP!

Earlier this month CBS News Minnesota reported on a congregation in Minneapolis that made a daring move. The congregation was called to ministering to the many women in their community, some of them as young as 13-years old, who in desperation had turned to prostitution in order to make enough money to live on. As their ministry grew, the congregation opened up their church building to these women to help them rebuild their lives and move in new directions. But they heard something surprising from the women. The women told them that the church building where they came to find "sanctuary" also filled them with shame. As many of the women looked at the beautiful stained glass windows in the Sanctuary and were looked down upon by biblical figures, they worried about their separation from God and that no matter what they did, God would always judge them. At the same time a philanthropist from New York approached the church and offered to give the congregation a large donation in exchange for their windows. After much thought and prayer the congregation decided to take the donor up on his offer, selling the windows and replacing them with plain, clear-glass windows for their Sanctuary. "If these windows are a stumbling block to someone who wants to change their lives, the windows have to go. The gospel has to be real," Rev. Alika Galloway, one of the pastors of the church said. She added that their "decommissioning will mean life for someone else." The money from the sale will be used to fund the transformative ministry that this congregation is doing in their local community. The church now has windows where they can see "out" into their community during worship, and the community can see "into" the church. Clear and transparent.

I found this story very moving. The boldness and faithfulness of this congregation was inspirational to me. Their willingness to let go of something that I am sure was a beautiful and beloved part of their church building is a rarity in most congregations. Their vision for the future and willingness to dive headlong into God's call in mission I see as a call-to-action for many congregations today.

What would it be like to be a member of a congregation that did something like this in the name of mission and service to God's people? What would it feel like to be one of the women served by this congregation's ministry—to know of the incredible sacrifice that others made so that you could have new life? What would it be like to live near that congregation, and know nothing of a church or how to be a Christian—but to hear about what they did—and be drawn to a story about Jesus?

We are having conversations here in our congregation, and I can tell you that as I talk to my colleagues in ministry in our Presbytery and around our country—all their congregations are talking about the same things we are. How can we best be faithful in God's world, today? How do we make do with less? Is there a different or a new way to live as Christians? What is more important to us, our building or our mission—is there a way to marry these things together? How I am called to live as an individual follower of Jesus—how am I called to live in a community that follows Jesus?

Our Session is talking about these things as well. In mid-November we had a retreat afternoon and talked about things we'd like to do with worship to invite greater engagement and participation. There are a few changes you should know about:

- We are going to try some interactive ways of praying with each other in worship during the season of Advent (December)
- We are thinking about ways to integrate more video and audio into worship in ways that make sense for our tradition
- We are committed to engaging more visual-artistic elements in worship starting in the New Year

The last decision we made is a big one: we are going to try to worship at a new time once a month in the New Year for six-month as a trial period. As we have listened to members of our congregation and community the feedback we are hearing from many (but not all) is that morning worship on Sunday does not work anymore in their lives. They want to be here, but they can't be here. For many of our younger families—coming to worship on Sunday morning means saying "no" to their children's participation in sports with their friends and it's a no-win choice to make. Some have told us that it is hard to "get up and get going" on Sunday mornings. Others find that weekends are their only opportunity to visit and take care of ailing relatives who are near but just far away enough to not be able to get back to the North Plainfield area on Sunday mornings.

So, here's the proposal: On the Second Sundays of each month (January to June) we will not have Sunday morning worship service. Instead we will gather for worship in the late afternoon on Sundays at 4PM. Church school will still be held during the worship hour. And instead of coffee hour, we will share a potluck meal with each other in the Parish Hall and have time for fellowship and dinner together. We'll have you out of here by 6PM so that you can get home and prepare for the week ahead.

I know that there is no perfect date or time for anything we do here at the church, (including worship) that will satisfy everyone. That's why we are having a trial period. Try this on for size, see what we think.

The Session and I are 100% be open for your feedback throughout the process.

What we do know is this: something has to change around here! We all know that we see less of each other on Sunday mornings for worship. We want to create the opportunity for more of us to worship together as a community—and do something new that says to those around us who are not here that we are willing to change, and we are willing to "do church" in some new ways to be responsive to the community around us.

The church in Minneapolis gives me hope. I know that they must have had a lot of give-and-take as they decided to jump into the mission that God was calling them to—which also meant letting go of something beautiful and beloved. It must have been a scary leap of faith.



And yet they jumped.

They trusted that God was there to catch them—and then walk beside them.

I have that faith for our ministry at Watchung Avenue. I have faith that even as we take some risks and try some things that might be out of our comfort zone or even at a time that isn't usual for us that God will walk with us and that God will continue to provide for us. I have faith that God is not done with us, and that there are all sorts of new and exciting adventures in ministry ahead of us. I have faith that we can let go of some of our comforts, schedules, and tradition to make way for new life. And I have faith that we have all sorts of untapped resources just waiting to bubble to the top and be put to good use.

It is December—it is Advent. We gather in our homes around Christmas trees and crèches, we gather for worship in celebration of the Christ Child. Christmas is a reminder that are lives are not about the "stuff" we accumulate, gifts, presents—even buildings or beloved parts of buildings. Christmas is about celebrating the gift of the Christ Child—the gift of Resurrection that God offers us so that we can step into our lives with no fear—but trust, that God is with us, God is among us, and God is walking beside us. I am so grateful to our Session for their leadership and their trust, and I am looking forward with lots of joy to the Advent and Christmas Season before us and the new things that we will do together in the New Year!

Next, my grandfather was determined. He risked his life for his country. He was a teacher at heart and was determined to pass along his knowledge of air planes to others. Nothing was too big or small to teach others.



LEAP OF FAITH

Oct. 15, 2011 - our 60th aid shipment for the people of Nicaragua



Many people, many varied groups, many leaps make our aid containers possible. Here's our story...

Inspired by our Nicaraguan partner organizations, we took on our 60th aid shipment on a perfect October day, sorting, packing, labeling, and steadily loading towards filling the cavernous 45 foot cargo container. We knew that with this aid, Inhijambia would save more young people from the dangers of exploitation and drugs; FEDICAMP would nurture an agriculture of life through reforestation and organic gardening; and the Masaya Women's Collectives would empower through literacy and economic independence. They turn our good intentions and eleven hundred boxes and items of aid into good works, helping fulfill the dreams and hopes of individuals, organizations, and communities.

Our aid shipments take many small steps to accomplish this huge less of faith each time we begin raising the funds and collecting the materials necessary to make fill the container and to pay for the shipping costs, steps taken by a wide array of people from all walks of life. It especially takes the steadfastness and generosity of the United Presbyterian Church, who have hosted and sustained our aid shipments since the late 1980's.

I start collecting weeks before the loading date. We got a huge boost from a collection of school supplies from the Quest for Peace Clean Your Desk network. During shipment week, I rent a truck and gather bioyoles from Jim Virosco, as well as with an assortment of crutches, walkers, and more from Naomi Theisz. This year a Drew University PeaceWorks' intern, Jason Hammond, helped me tremendously during the two weeks before the shipment day and on the day itself.

Then it's on to Pioneer Freight Systems shipping yard where we unloaded my 17ft truck, this year with the help of Guy Talbot and Jason to get a big head start on the next day's loading.

The long day at United Presbyterian. Church in Plainfield starts early with me and Jason arriving with my truck, opening storage rooms, and greeting Skip Hansen, the wonderful person from United who gets the coffee and food going for volunteers. We cannot imagine a shipment without Skip and of all the people at United Presbyterian.

It's organized confusion as all the aid and volunteers come in with groups stuffing clothes into bags, others packing boxes, and some sorting.

Cleta Ciulla, Bill Paolino, and frienda came in from Rockland County, NY with a truckload for San Marcos, Jinotega, and Omotepe. And our longtime shipping partners and supporters from Christ Church in Summit led by

Dan Ocone and Maurice Devroye, came in with lots of supplies for Inhijambia and the street children. Jim Walker came in from Vermont with a load of school supplies for Solentiname.

Many people work throughout the day — we are deeply grateful for their help, enthusiasm, good humor, and patience — especially in the

tedious, exhausting last few bours

We were able to load all the materials donated and packed that day. We also put many items we had kept in two storage rooms onto the container. By 8:53 we shut the cargo container doors and cleaned up the loading area. Michael drove off with the container by about 9:30 and the diehards set off for a Salvadoran restaurant for a well-earned meal and home for a good night's sleep.
