SCRIPTURE READINGS

Lay Reader: We begin this last Sunday in Easter with the story of Jesus' ascension in Acts. Only Luke and Acts (written by the same author) are there stories of Jesus' ascension. Jesus promises that the Holy Spirit will come upon them, and not to worry about what will happen next. As Jesus ascends into heaven, two angels ask the disciples why they are looking up towards heaven, because Jesus will return the way they saw him go. It is a good reminder for us—all too often, we are waiting for God to

do something, looking up in the sky—when God is already among us, already at work in us.

Acts 1:6-14 NRSV

⁶So when they had come together, they asked him, "Lord, is this the time when you will restore the kingdom to Israel?" ⁷He replied, "It is not for you to know the times or periods that the Father has set by his own authority. ⁸But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you

will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth."

⁹When he had said this, as they were watching, he was lifted up, and a cloud took him out of their sight. ¹⁰While he was going and they were gazing up toward heaven, suddenly two men in white robes stood by them. 11They said, "Men of Galilee, why do you stand looking up toward heaven? This Jesus, who has been taken up from you into heaven, will come in the same way as you saw him go

into heaven."

¹²Then they returned to Jerusalem from the mount called Olivet, which is near Jerusalem, a sabbath day's journey away. ¹³When they had entered the city, they went to the room upstairs where they were staying, Peter, and John, and James, and Andrew, Philip and Thomas, Bartholomew and Matthew, James son of Alphaeus, and Simon the Zealot, and Judas son of James. 14All these were constantly devoting themselves to prayer, together with certain women, including Mary the mother of

Jesus, as well as his brothers.

The passages from 1 Peter 4 and 5 reminds us that in our suffering, to lean upon God and to give our burdens over to God, because God cares for us (5:7). We are called to resist evil, and that sometimes in our resisting evil, we struggle. But we can rest in God, for God is always with us. God gives us strength and endurance to persevere.

1 Peter 4:12-14; 5:6-11 NRSV

4 ¹²Beloved, do not be surprised at the fiery ordeal that is taking place among you to test you, as though something strange were happening to you. ¹³But rejoice insofar as you are sharing Christ's sufferings, so that you may also be glad and shout for joy when his glory is revealed. ¹⁴If you are reviled for the name of Christ, you are blessed, because the spirit of glory, which is the Spirit of God, is resting on you.

5 ⁶Humble yourselves therefore under the mighty hand of God, so that he may exalt you in due time. ⁷Cast all your anxiety on him, because he cares for you.

⁸Discipline yourselves, keep alert. Like a roaring lion your adversary the devil prowls around, looking for someone to devour. ⁹Resist him, steadfast in your faith, for you know that your brothers and sisters in all the world are undergoing the same kinds of suffering.

¹⁰And after you have suffered for a little while, the God of all grace, who has called you to his eternal glory in Christ, will himself restore, support, strengthen, and establish you. ¹¹To him be the power

Lean Upon God – 1 Peter 4:12-14; 5:6-11

Let us pray: Bless the words of my lips and the meditations of our hearts that they may be of profit to us and acceptable to thee, our rock, and our redeemer. Amen

I read a story about a man who stumbled onto a subway car, just as the doors were closing. His clothing was rumpled, his necktie was all askew, he had bright red lipstick marks on his cheek and collar.

He reeked of booze and had a bottle of cheap gin sticking out of his jacket pocket. He staggered over and plopped down in the seat next to the priest. After sighing heavily, the man opened a crumpled newspaper and began to read.

A few minutes later the man leaned toward the priest and said, "What causes arthritis?" The priest said, with almost a sneer in his voice, "It is caused by riotous living. Too much drinking and carousing and doing immoral things with immoral women, that's what causes arthritis!" The man pondered that for a second and replied, "Hmmm," then went back to his newspaper.

Feeling a little guilty, the priest leaned toward the man and said, "I'm sorry I was so uncharitable just now. That was not a very Christian way to respond to you and I apologize. How long have you had arthritis?" "Oh," the man said, "I don't have arthritis. I just read that the Pope did."

We are so intent on finding just the right way to tell someone off, that we forget the words of reconciliation you have taught to us. If that statement sounds familiar to you it is because it was part of the words that was said in our Prayer of Confession this morning.

But the best part of confessing is that we are forgiven. The priest in the story reconciled himself by apologizing to the man for being unchristian like. I am sure he really felt remorse when the man told him he was inquiring about arthritis because he read the Pope had it.

Peter, in his first pastoral letter, brings up an issue that has bothered people of faith for thousands of years, and has been a source of debate for many an atheist as well. Every group who believes in a higher being must struggle to answer the question, "Why does God allow suffering in the world?"

Let me give you a little background history to answer that question first. The 1st Epistle of Peter was written from Rome to the Christians throughout Asia Minor (what is now Turkey) at or near the time that Nero was the Roman emperor. Remember Nero – the Emperor who ordered the fires to be set – so that he could rebuild the city the way he wanted it.

The emperor and his people blamed this new religious group (the Christians) for setting the fires. Thus, began one of the worst persecutions of Christians in history. During the next few years, Christians were fed to wild animals for the amusement of Roman citizens. The Romans crucified Christians in unbelievable numbers.

And these Christian believers were even tied into little stands, doused with oil, and set afire so that the emperor's guests would have light for their evenings' entertainment. And while all this was going on, Nero was taking all the money and possessions from Roman Christians and using the money to rebuild the city he had destroyed.

It is out of this world of horrific persecution that Peter wrote, Beloved, don't be astonished at the fiery trial which has come upon you, to test you, as though a strange thing happened to you....If you are insulted for the name of Christ, you are blessed; because the Spirit of glory and of God rests on you (1 Peter 4:12, 14)

Those to whom Peter had written would certainly be able to relate to suffering criticism for Christ. They had been forced to flee their homes because of their faith in Christ. They lived a life of uncertainty and great difficulty, being rejected by most society. They were pushed to the fringes of society, often impoverished, and ridiculed simply because they had believed in Christ as Lord and Savior.

This begs the question – how is one happy when suffering blame? This all depends on one's perspective and attitude. Peter wanted them to view their struggles through the lens of faith, not through what their eyes could see.

While they suffered greatly in this life for their faith, their suffering and commitment to Christ were not in vain. They endured difficulty, but their eternal destiny was secure in Christ. They had to come to the realization that temporary suffering was a small price to pay in light of eternal life in Christ.

When they viewed their reproach through the perspective of faith, it was easier to endure, and they were even able to rejoice. But, why would God allow such horrible things to happen to God's people?

The Apostle Peter gives us three possible ideas to partially explain human suffering. First, suffering may indeed provide the test by which our faith is strengthened that turns our faith from impure to pure metal.

Second, suffering provides us a way to be more deeply connected to Jesus' suffering, thereby deepening our connection to Him as our Savior.

And third, suffering "in accordance with God's will," provides us an opportunity to truly live out our faith. If we can do it when everything around us seems bleak, we can do it anytime.

In Jan Karon's Mitford series of books, she writes about Fr. Tim, an Episcopal priest in a small town and parish. In her volume titled, <u>In This Mountain</u>, Fr. Tim gets seriously ill and he tells the congregation one Sunday morning that in the middle of the night, as he struggled with his sermon, he finally decided that he had to surrender and try a new attitude. Fr. Tim says,

Our obedience will say, Father, I do not know why You are causing, or allowing this hard thing to happen, but I am going to give thanks in it because You ask me to. I am going to trust You to have a purpose for it that I cannot know and may never know. Bottom line, you are God – and that is good enough for me.

Our text today continues that thought, but Peter takes their responsibilities in a different direction. Most believers in that day dealt with opposition from the world, knowing all too well the difficulties of being a committed Christian during a pagan culture.

Peter does not shy away from the truth, nor does he try to minimize the reality of their lives. He is very straightforward with the church. In fact, instead of trying to alter their focus, Peter dealt candidly with the sufferings they faced. He knew their suffering would likely continue, and he wanted to prepare them to endure even though they faced great opposition.

It is difficult for us to genuinely relate to the plight of the early believers, but these principles remain true. Our world is rapidly changing, and we too must prepare for the difficulties that are sure to come.

While we hate to admit it, the Lord often uses difficulties to strengthen our faith and reliance upon Him. The suffering we endure from time to time is beneficial in our Christian lives.

God allows trials to come into our lives to try our faith and strengthen our resolve. While our nature resists and despises trials, the Lord knows they are beneficial in our lives. Through them we realize our weakness and learn dependence upon the Lord.

The Lord sustains us during trials, while our faith in Him grows. While trials are never enjoyable at the moment, once they are over, they almost always produce stronger Christians who are more mature in the faith. Covid-19 is a trial which has come into our lives; this is just a reality of our Christian journey. As we suffer for our faith in Christ, we are partaking in His sufferings. Consider all that Christ suffered on our behalf.

He was falsely accused, condemned to death, scourged, mocked, rejected, and crucified. All of this was done in submission to the Father's will to provide redemption.

As we embrace the suffering we encounter for the Christ, we are following His example, submitting to the will of God for our lives to serve and honor Him. While suffering is not enjoyable, it is a great honor and privilege to identify with the sufferings of our Lord.

Our rejoicing in trials provides great benefit as we walk with the Lord in this life, and it will produce great joy as we meet the Lord when He returns. The suffering we endure in this life will not compare to the glory that will be revealed when the Lord comes again.

Those who suffer for Christ never suffer alone. Peter assured them, as they faced trials and suffering for Christ, they would receive the Spirit of God and His glory resting upon them.

Peter did not promise the Lord would prevent suffering, but he did reveal the Lord had promised to meet them in their suffering, and provide the provision of His Spirit to guide, guard, comfort, and enable them to endure.

I certainly do not pray for trials and suffering in my life, but there is a presence and provision from the Lord that is only experienced amid those difficulties. In fact, I am convinced we experience the Lord more intimately in those moments than at any other time in our lives.

Trials are not enjoyable, but if we can experience His presence amid them, growing in our faith, being conformed to His image, then we must agree they are beneficial.

I think you will agree this has been a difficult passage to consider. It is easy enough to understand, but difficult to put in practice. As believers we must view our trials considering God's plan and purpose for our lives, while striving to present a positive witness among unbelievers. If you are struggling, lean upon God for guidance and strength to endure! Amen."

Let us pray: Heavenly Father, there is a part of me that wants to have a nice easy, trouble-free existence and yet I know that this life is a training ground to draw me closer to You and to conform me day by day into the likeness of Christ. May I not be surprised at the fiery ordeals that I am called upon to endure, but embrace them so that I may be used in this sin-sick world to comfort others with the same comfort that I receive from You - this I ask in Jesus name, AMEN.
